FEEDBACK ANALYSIS

i. ALUMNI

The feedback from the alumni is not taken in the specific format. The representative of alumni is an active member in the IQAC. The Alumni member attends the IQAC meetings regularly and makes valuable suggestions in the overall development of the college. Alumni give their feedback orally and they also look after whether their suggestions are implemented in due course of time. The Alumni members were invited to college during the occasion of various functions and activities. They offer suggestions when they visit the college during different functions and activities. Some of them are in the written form in the college visitors' book.

ii. PARENTS

Our college has formed Teacher-Parent Association (TPA). One of the senior faculty members is designated as a co-ordinator. In each academic year at least two meetings of TPA are arranged for discussing the development and progression of their wards. During such meeting parents gives valuable suggestions orally for creating a congenial atmosphere in the college. They are invited as guests and as audience for many of our college activities. Parents whole heartedly participate and witness the performances of their wards and appreciate the efforts of the teachers. Some of the parents are our alumni also. There is representation in IQAC and they register their suggestion in the IQAC meetings. Some parents have recorded their opinions in the visitors' book.

iii. STUDENTS

Analysis of student feedback on 'Course'

A feedback was collected from Arts and Commerce students of our college about the UG Programmes with regard to parameters like Learning values, Applicability, depth of the course contents, extent of coverage of course, clarity and relevance of reading materials and extent of efforts required by the students. The same has been analyzed. The observations derived from the feedback are as follows:

- 1. 65% of students from Arts opined that the 'learning values' and the 'applicability of course' are very good which reflects that the course they are pursuing is meeting the needs of current competitive world and helps a lot to better their position in building their career. And 92% from Commerce stream are of the opinion that the 'learning values' are really very good and 40% of them opined the 'applicability of course' is to be strengthened.
- 2. On an average of 53% of the respondents from both the streams opined that the depth of the course content is very good. This reveals that nearly the half of the respondents suggested for further deepening of the contents.
- 3. Regarding the 'Extent of coverage of course', 59% of respondents from Commerce are of the very good opinion. On the other hand 52% of respondents from Arts opined that, it is to be improved. 44% of the respondents felt that there must be further improvement in 'coverage'.
- 4. On an average of 63% of the respondents opined that the 'Clarity and relevance of the course' is moderate, which reveals that it is to be revised.

5. 'Extent of effort required by student', 59% of the respondents from Arts and 36% from Commerce opined that efforts required by students are moderate. This analysis reveals that there must be further infusion of motivational factors so as to generate interest in the course they are pursuing.

Analysis of student feedback on 'Campus Experience'

The feedback from students was collected in the specific, structured format on their 'Campus Experience'. There were ten parameters on which the students have given their opinions. Nearly 72% of the students opined the infrastructure like ICT classrooms, Library & e-library services, all the labs, computers and net facility and other sports facilities are excellent. 70% are of the opinion that the overall campus is excellent and learners' friendly. A very few students have expressed their views on greenery to be improved. Most of the students liked the working of the labs by saying 'good' about them.

Analysis of student feedback on 'Teachers'

A structured format was prepared and administered on the students for getting feedback on the teachers with parameters like regularity in conducting classes, subject preparation, presentation skills, methodology used in teaching, interaction with students, use of ICT devices, convincing way and the bowing effect.

Out of 193 students, 87% of students gave full marks to all the teachers for their punctuality, subject knowledge, presentation skills and methodology used in imparting the knowledge. About 13% opined that teachers are good and satisfactory in the above mentioned qualities.

67% of students suggested for use of modern teaching aids. They feel that ICT enabled teaching is more impressive than chalk and talk method. 73% students are impressive on the matter that they can interact with 90% of the teachers off the classrooms. Most of the students suggest that just 3 to 4 % of teachers are not effective in convincing the depth of the course content even after their conscious efforts.

Students opined that 95% of the teachers are particular in completing the syllabi in time. They put more efforts than others to use relevant examples to suffice the subject matter. 98% of teachers are really mentors and they create curiosity in the subject as well as learning.

The above given analysis is purely based on the feedback of students. Though the students have expressed good opinion about their teachers, we are aware that we must always update and upgrade our knowledge to be in the best position in the opinion of student community as well as the society.

FELICITATION OF MERITORIOUS STUDENTS

Goals:

- To identify the best performing of students.
- To motivate students for achieving excellence in both curricular and extracurricular activities.
- To motivate teachers for guiding students for excellent achievement.

Context:

The practice of felicitation of meritorious students has been introduced in our college long back since year 2003. Earlier it was just an event to appreciate the students who score 90 percentage and more in respective subjects in the university exams. At the initial stage the number of students was meagre, to say, it was not more than five. Year by year our students impressed by the felicitation of such outstanding performers in academic, sports and cultural activities and they felt extremely hopeful of achieving the same. They are motivated by the few and the number grew more than 100 in just five years. Then the cut-off standard was enhanced to 95 percentages. Even this was not impossible for our students. During this academic year about 68 students of our college have secured 95 percentage and above. So, along with the students, teachers also have been felicitated with "Letter of Appreciation" from the college. So this activity has become the best practice of our college.

Objectives:

- To felicitate the students for their excellent performance.
- To bring about changes in the learning process.
- To recognize the service of the dedicated teachers.

The Practice:

This best practice has created an urge in the students to perform well in their curricular and extra-curricular activities. This has given a chance to our college for the first time to get the 7th Rank in BA in the year 2006 for the Karnataka University, Dharwad. It was a booster for all the teachers and students. Since then, the practice was made the hall mark of our institution; faculty was consistently guiding the students in that direction. It is worth to mention that, our six students of B.Com III & IV Sem secured 100 marks in Corporate Accounting, two from B.Com II Sem in Financial Accounting and one student from B.Sc. II Sem secured 100 out of 100 in Mathematics. Totally 09 students are Centum Scorers in our college. During the academic year 2017-18 six students of our college are selected as University Blues in Cycling and Kabaddi.

Obstacles:

- Identifying the parameters for the excellent performance.
- Large number of students.
- Fixing the cut-off standard.
- Resource mobilization.

Strategies adopted to overcome the obstacles:

- Since all the students are engaged in different activities like inter-collegiate competitions, sports and cultural events, most of them achieve success. So, the expert committee of our college developed the parameters to identify the excellent performer.
- When the number of achievers exceeded more than 100, the standard was set to 95 marks.

Resources for cash prizes and funds for providing to students with certificates and shawls/bouquets & mementos were mobilized from alumni, faculty, patrons and out of college funds.

Impact of the practice:

The practice of felicitation to students and faculty members has changed the entire climate in our campus. The attitude of students was changed and they adopted well developed reading habits. They have become more conscious and studious. The rank a student got was the incremental growth and is the result of advanced facilities in all the spheres of the college and such practices. This created awareness among the students. Even in sports our students achieved a commendable performance. Our college has produced 127 University Blues, since its inceptions and it has become Champion for 26 times in Valley Ball, 27 times in Kabaddi, 03 times in Cricket and Cycling respectively.

Resources required:

Our college is practicing this activity since 2003. It requires lot of efforts from both the students as well as the teachers. For scoring high marks students need to attend extra marathon work in their fields. It needed extra coaching. Hence, the college arranged for special lecture series, student seminars, student exchange programmes, field visits, study tours, research projects and competitions. This requires more funds for honorarium and TA/DA for trainers, experts and resource persons. It also requires quality infrastructure. The available infrastructure in the college is upgraded.

Goals:

Context:

This activity was introduced in our college during academic year 2014-15. The affluent institutions like UGC, NAAC, ISEC provide financial support for carrying research activities in the higher education institutions. This has enhanced the teacher participation in research activities. But there are very limited opportunities for students except seminars & conferences to get involve in research activities. Therefore, to provide plat form exclusively for rural background students, this kind of "Inter-Collegiate Student Seminars" programmes started in our college. The students from surrounding colleges have actively participated. So this activity has become the best practice of our college.

Objectives:

- To motivate the students to present research papers.
- To assist the students for their excellent performance with cash prizes.
- To create research environment in the college.
- To identify the ignited minds in the rural areas.

The Practice:

This practice has created an urge in the students to involve in the research activities. This has given a chance to our college to invite student researchers who are studying in both UG and PG. The seminars are conducted in Arts, Science and Commerce subjects. Usually an expert in the subject is invited for the key note and then the students from surrounding colleges present their papers. The experts choose three 'Best Paper Presenters' and are awarded with cash prizes of 3000, 2000 and 1000, instituted by our alumni. The college supports with financial assistance to carry out the activity.

It was a booster for all the students. Since then, the practice was made the hall mark of our institution; faculty was consistently guiding the students in that direction. It has motivated many other colleges to conduct such kind of student seminar. This made the students as well as teachers to engage themselves in research activities.

Obstacles:

- Identifying the parameters for the best presentation.
- Low number of student participation.
- Mobilizing the resource.

Strategies adopted to overcome the obstacles:

Since all the students are engaged in different activities like inter-collegiate competitions, sports and cultural events, most of them achieve success. So, the expert committee of our college developed the parameters to identify the best presenter.

- The faculty took personal interest in inviting the students and alumni.
- Funds for cash prizes are instituted by the alumni and funds for certificates and local hospitality was provided by the college.

Impact of the practice:

This practice has changed the attitudes and they have developed reading habits. Students become more conscious and studious. For the first time in 2014-15 Department of Commerce and English took initiation in organizing inter-collegiate student's seminars. During this academic year the college organizes 09 seminars. The departments are English, Kannada, Political Science, History, Journalism, Commerce, Economics, Physics and Chemistry. More than 650 students' participated and 175 papers are presented. The immediate impact of this is found in the initiation of other departments to organize such a kind of seminars in the respective subjects. This event brought radical changes in learning and research habits of the students. It has given opportunities to the teachers to guide the students.

Resources required:

Our college is practicing this activity from 2014-15. It requires lot of efforts from both the students and the teachers. Students need to attend extra marathon work. It needed extra coaching. Hence, the college arranged for special lecture series, student exchange programmes, field visits, study tours, research reports and competitions. This requires much fund for honorarium and TA/DA for experts and cash prizes.

To continue the practice in the coming days also, the college needs funds. We hope sponsors will provide the resources required.
